# A MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

While we've all been through so many challenges in the past twelve months, it has been an inspiration to see our community band together and reach out to anyone who needs help. Our Hawkesbury spirit, shown throughout the flood and since, has only reinforced what incredible resilience we have.

As part of our ongoing flood recovery, we are posting regular recovery updates at yourhawkesbury-yoursay.com.au/fih2021 which are available to everyone. You can also find out about grants and financial assistance available. The flood damage has been significant and, although we have repaired many areas, Greens Road, Lower Portland was extensively damaged and remains closed while geotechical survey results are collected to determine our next steps. Upper Colo Bridge will need to be replaced since it was destroyed in the flood.

Community Hubs have also been set up in the Hawkesbury where you can speak with recovery officers, support services and other government departments that can help you to navigate your flood recovery and help you access support and assistance all in one location. Supporting the restoration of our local environment is an important part of our bushfire recovery. Our community groups have been able to apply for new tree planting grants available from the Foundation for National Parks & Wildlife (FNPW) to restore bushfire affected regions, including the Hawkesbury, that were left scarred by the 2019-2020 bushfires.

In 2020, FNPW supported the upgrade of the Hawkesbury Community Nursery to become a bushfire recovery nursery to assist in restoration activities.



I'm proud that Council's Hawkesbury Community Nursery in Mulgrave is supplying trees for the 2021 planting season under this grant program.

Council is also implementing some great community projects in Bilpin, Colo Heights and the Macdonald Valley as part of bushfire recovery, see more about this on page 3.

I also encourage you to support our local businesses as much as you can by buying local. A great initiative from our Visitor Information Centre is launching Bilpin's Apple Pie Trail to support our local businesses and tourism. Find out more at **discoverthehawkesbury.com.au**

# LOCAL RECOVERY

The regions of Bilpin, Colo Heights and the Macdonald Valley will share in \$1.68 million of funding for local projects under the Federal and NSW Government's Bushfire Local Economic Recovery Package.

Work has commenced on these projects which will support the local communities by improving recreational and community infrastructure and increase preparedness for future bushfire seasons. See the projects below.

### **Bilpin Hall Precinct**

Community artwork, 120,000 litre water storage tank and pump for community use during bushfires, extra storage area for community use and Rural Fire Service (RFS) briefings.

### Bilpin Hall fire resistance

Leaf guard for gutters, sprinkler system, heavy duty screens on windows and doors, door upgrades, community message board, 10kw solar energy system with battery storage, small generator set with essential services circuit throughout the building.

# **Bilpin Oval**

Playground for all ages, oval and carpark upgrade, landscaping with new picnic shelters, 120,000 litre water storage tank and pump for community use during bushfires.

## **St Albans Town Centre**

Yarning circle, picnic shelters with tables, new playground and paths, community artwork.

### St Albans RFS Shed fire resistance

Leaf guard for gutters, sprinkler system, heavy duty screens on windows and doors, door upgrades, community message board, 10kw solar energy system with battery storage, small generator set with essential services circuit throughout the building, radio tower, shed extension for additional trucks, 120,000 litre water storage tank and pump for community use during bushfires.

### St Albans School of Arts (Council funding)

Removal of old toilet building, sprinkler system, heavy duty screens on windows and doors, door upgrades, community message board, 10kw solar energy system with battery storage, small generator set with essential services circuit throughout the building.



# COMMUNITY MADE ARTWORKS

Three beautiful public art pieces will be commissioned as a memorial to the 2019–2020 bushfires and honour those who risked so much to keep our community safe.

These artworks, created in close partnership with community members of Bilpin, Colo Heights and the Macdonald Valley, will be installed as part of the Bushfire Local Economic Recovery projects that are currently underway.

Residents will be invited to special community events to design and paint an artwork, which will be transferred to a tile to be glazed, fired and installed on a special wall. This will be a powerful way for the community to take ownership of these artworks and make them a personal expression of their experiences of recovery and rejuvenation that will last for generations to view, understand and remember.

# Colo Heights Hall fire resistance

Roof cleaning and painting, air conditioning, commercial grade kitchen, accessible toilet upgrade, sprinkler system, heavy duty screens on windows and doors, door upgrades, community message board, 10kw solar energy system with battery storage, small generator set with essential services circuit throughout the building, 120,000 litre water storage tank and pump for community use during bushfires, replacement of old and damaged signs.

### **Colo Heights Hall Precinct**

Multi-purpose full court, picnic tables and shelters, landscaping, pathways, bollard fences, bin surrounds, oval improvements, community artwork.

# THANK YOU SES

Thank you to our SES volunteers and all of our Emergency Services who are always there during our times of need. More than 10,000 NSW SES members freely give their time and expertise during emergencies to help our community.

Hawkesbury's crews and other units have been working so hard for us, with the Black Summer fires of 2019-2020 and the March 2021 flood. SES crews responded to many hundreds of requests for assistance across the Hawkesbury as the floodwaters rose and assisted our whole community during and after the flood.

Over the past year, NSW SES volunteers responded to more than 42,000 requests for assistance. More than 10,000 of those were during the recent floods



that affected the Hawkesbury-Nepean Valley, Hunter and Mid North Coast.

NSW SES volunteers respond to storms and floods but they also do so much more. They respond to tsunamis, road crash rescues, bush search and rescues and even support other emergency services by providing life-saving first aid. Their support also extends well beyond NSW, supporting interstate communities after catastrophic events.

In partnership with the NSW Government, GIVIT is managing donations during this recovery. GIVIT is working directly with Hawkesbury City Council, outreach teams, local charities and community groups to identify exactly what's needed.

GIVIT is free, private and easy to use, and currently supports over 3,800 Australian organisations. 100% of donated money will be used to purchase essential items and services needed by people and communities impacted.

All NSW charities, services and community groups are encouraged to register with GIVIT, free of charge, to access thousands of wonderful donations offered by generous individuals and corporates. Register via givit.org.au/need-help/organisations

GIVIT has coordinated the donation of almost 13,000 items to flood affected residents in the Hawkesbury. With donated funds from the Flood Appeal, GIVIT has purchased grocery vouchers from Wisemans Ferry Grocer to support local flood affected families.

A special Flood Recovery Clean Up Day was held recently to help restore our local parks and natural environment by removing flood debris from the major flood in March.

60 local volunteers gathered across four locations: Argyle Bailey Memorial Park, Ebenezer; Cattai Creek, Glenorie; Colbee Park, McGraths Hill; and Deerubbin Park, Cornwallis.

Hawkesbury City Council partnered with Clean Up Australia and OzFish to coordinate the clean up.

A number of volunteer groups also came on board for the Cattai Creek Clean Up including Galston-Glenorie Fishing Club, Hawkesbury-Nepean Landcare, Glenorie Progress Association and the Cattai Hills Environment Network.

They collected several tonnes of waste and a sealed drum of a hazardous chemical was reported to the Environment Protection Authority and removed.





David has achieved the National Bravery award and Long Service award in his 48 years of services with the Rural Fire Service.

On a catastrophic day on 12 November 2019, as Deputy Group Captain in the Hawkesbury, David led a team to safety after being entrapped in a burn over at Colo Heights. The firefront had flame heights of 60 metres and wind gusts high enough to tear metal sheets off buildings.

David's good leadership decisions allowed every crew member to be able to return home safely. His bravery and leadership is truly inspiring.

David has gained great respect within the community through his personal sacrifices and his generous spirit.
