A MESSAGE FROM THE **MAYOR**

Welcome to your 2023 Community Report. You may have received this report with a rates notice or be reading it online at www.hawkesbury.nsw.gov.au

Included with the rates notice is a personal letter from me.

I understand that there is frustration in the community about the state of our roads since the floods, but our road crews are working hard to deliver these road repairs as quickly as possible.

Please continue to be patient, drive to the conditions and be courteous when you are on the road. I drive on these roads every day, as do the majority of our staff who also live locally. It may not always look like it from out on the roads, but behind the scenes a huge amount of work is continuously undertaken by our passionate and committed teams in designing repairs, sourcing contractors and securing materials to fix our severely damaged roads.

With the completion of Greens Road and Upper Colo Bridge, the next big flood project we will tackle is the restoration of the 1830s heritage-listed Thomas James Bridge at Lower Macdonald. This is a complicated project and there has been a lot of work going on behind the scenes with engineers, heritage experts and the NSW Government. We are confident that we will have good news on a commencement date very soon.

We also continue to advocate strongly for better support from the Federal and State Governments, including the provision of better flood evacuation routes and a speedy resolution to the damage to the flood mitigation network in Cornwallis. Council will continue to hold the NSW Government to account on its commitment to timing and for the rapid approval of funding so we can get on with the job of repairing the damaged drain and reinstating the protection of Cornwallis and Richmond Lowlands.

It is exciting to know that we can now access the materials, extra staff and contractors that we need to speed up our road repair works. Close to \$35 million of repairs have been carried out over the past 12 months, including the \$15 million rebuild of Greens Road at Lower Portland and the \$3 million replacement of the wooden Upper Colo Bridge with a resilient concrete crossing. This is from a \$240 million repair program that involves nearly a quarter of our roads – all funded through Federal and State Government recovery programs. I was delighted to meet Dr Michelle Ryan and Brittany Vermeulen from Western Sydney University when we launched the River Snap project at Howe Park, Windsor. The project will help to monitor river health. See details on page 3.

Local Government Week will be held from 31 July to 6 August and as part of this, we will celebrate with the community at Hawkesbury Fest on Sunday, 6 August, see page 3. Hawkesbury Library Service will also host Library Information Week, see page 12.

Council has joined with Western Sydney University and the Hawkesbury Nepean Waterkeeper Alliance to encourage our community to help monitor the health of the Hawkesbury-Nepean River through the River Snap project.

The first River Snap stand has been installed at Howe Park, Windsor. To get involved, all you need to do is snap a photo of the river from a River Snap stand using your smartphone and upload it. The images will allow changes to the river and banks to be tracked over time to provide a better understanding of its overall health.

The project is funded through the University's strategic initiative fund and is coordinated by the School of Science and Sustainability Education and Partnerships.



GREENS ROAD

Greens Road at Lower Portland has reopened to traffic following a 12 month repair program that has included stabilising and restoring the embankment under the road (up to eight metres deep in some places), reinforcing the adjoining rock face, implementing drainage and replacing the road surface. More than 715 metres of road across two sites were repaired following the flood of March 2021, with further damage caused during the March and July 2022 floods. The works required Council and contractors to overcome a number of significant engineering challenges, and Council thanks residents for their patience while design and rectification works were completed.



UPPER COLO BRIDGE

The new Upper Colo Bridge has opened to traffic. The original timber bridge built in 1936 was washed away in the March 2021 flood, with work commencing on the new concrete bridge in June 2022, before a pause on works during the July 2022 flood. The new bridge provides a single lane for vehicles plus space for pedestrians and cyclists to safely cross and will offer a crossing resilient to future flooding and bushfires for many decades to come. The heritage of the original bridge has been honoured with the inclusion of wooden kerbs on the new bridge. Bench seating and interpretive signage reflecting on indigenous history in the Colo region, European colonisation and the history of the timber bridge – all fashioned from the original bridge timbers – were also installed near the bridge.

Council joined with McGraths Hill residents recently to celebrate the opening of the new playground at Ivy Avenue Reserve. Local residents were treated to free coffee, donuts and face painting.

The new playground includes swings plus net/hammock swing, climbing fort with slide and spiderweb climbing net, spinner and rocker. Landscaping including softfall and new walking paths was also included, and the perimeter fence was retained.

In 2023/2024, Council will replace the playgrounds at Pitt Town Memorial Park, Jack Gow Memorial Park in McGraths Hill, Freemans Reach Reserve Playground and Wilberforce Park. PITT TOWN MEMORIAL PARK PLAYGROUND

Council will begin construction of a new playground at Pitt Town Memorial Park on Wellesley Street in August. The new playground will include a climbing fort with slides, swings with nest swing, climbing net spinner, play walls, teeter totter, audio play, benches and landscaping.



FERNADELL PARK DRAINAGE

Drainage works will take place at Fernadell Park, Pitt Town in July. These works are an essential first step in the development of the park into a brand new community and recreation hub. Work is also taking place behind the scenes to finalise detailed designs for the rest of the park. The park and the community centre will be subject to two separate designs and the community will be given the opportunity to provide feedback. THOMAS JAMES BRIDGE AND SETTLERS ROAD TOTAL COST: APPROX \$24 MILLION

Council has appointed a contractor to undertake the reconstruction of the convict-built circa 1830s Thomas James Bridge on Settlers Road at Lower Macdonald. Council is now working with the contractor to establish a timeline for the reconstruction process. Council has also committed to meeting with Macdonald Valley residents once a start date is confirmed and to work through issues such as access through the site during works. The heritage-listed bridge and the rock upslope were damaged during the 2021 and 2022 floods. The repair works will be complicated and include cataloguing, removing and cleaning of the sandstone retaining wall bricks, reconstructing the internal bridge structure to ensure that it is stable and resilient against future flooding, rebuilding the retaining wall with each brick returned to its original place to protect its heritage, and stabilising the upslope rock.
