Item: 197 MM - Immediate Flood Mitigation, Flood Recovery and Flood Resilience in the

Hawkesbury - (138879)

BACKGROUND:

There can be no doubt that the Hawkesbury has suffered greatly due to floods over the last few years. Our community is centred around the beautiful, yet dangerous Hawkesbury-Nepean Valley Floodplain, one of the most hazardous floodplains within NSW, if not all of Australia. We have endured a total of six floods recently, which has had a measurable and dramatically negative impact on many homes, businesses, farmers, our local infrastructure such as roads and public space, and most importantly, our mental health. We are tired, exhausted and in need of assistance to build our community back to the expected standards.

During this time, our Council staff have been working above and beyond what would normally be expected of them in their daily duties, as they add large-scale, ongoing flood recovery projects to their schedules. This includes filling thousands upon thousands of potholes, designing entire new roads, engaging and managing external contractors, project managing significant damage to infrastructure and attending to hundreds of hours of flood recovery programs in our community.

What has resulted is an unacceptable situation; dealing with the scale of these ongoing and repeated natural disasters, and their financial impacts, are beyond our capacity as a small, metropolitan fringe Council. We know we are not alone and appreciate that many Council areas in NSW are experiencing the same impacts and the same problems. And as we sit here tonight, our thoughts go out to the communities of the Central West and particularly those in Eugowra, Forbes, Cowra and the many communities facing their own flood emergencies.

However, here in the Hawkesbury, our needs can be differentiated because we have been calling for help for some time now, due to the fact that we have been flooded so often. That request for assistance has escalated of late, with a series of letters to the NSW Government. This Mayoral Minute has been designed to kindly offer the Premier of NSW the chance to come to the Hawkesbury in person, to discuss the outstanding issues and inform our Council of the Government's response to these requests.

Before I list the items that we have been seeking immediate assistance for, I do wish to reiterate that as a Council, we welcome the acceleration of the raising of the Warragamba Dam wall as Critical Significant State Infrastructure and a recent desire by the NSW Government to fund the project. We do not want to see this project, which independent experts demonstrate will offer our community a higher level of flood mitigation, shelved again. Yet, we must acknowledge that this is a long-term strategy and that what we do also require, is immediate help now. (This Mayoral Minute does not intend to debate the Warragamba Dam wall raising, yet simply note that it is Council's current resolved position to support it).

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The table below has been provided as a summary of the current status quo, in approximate date order of Council's requests:

In addition to the above, we would request that the Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements are expedited to all NSW Councils, including advanced pre-payments or progress payments. This is due to councils having to pay the invoices for flood recovery works being completed locally, yet encountering a large gap of time before that money is returned to us. Our current estimates are around \$230 million. Hawkesbury City Council simply does not have endless pools of funds to continue to pay our contractors, so it is requested that councils are pre-paid and/or reimbursed in a more timely manner, to avoid a potential cash flow crises.

In essence, the above table demonstrates the advocacy that Hawkesbury City Council has continued to engage in, on behalf of our community. Whilst we will continue to improve, encourage and educate our community on flood danger, flood preparedness and flood resilience, we will also continue to be strong voices for a higher level of government assistance. That is why, in addition to our ongoing requests, we

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kindly ask that the NSW Premier come to the Hawkesbury, meet with us and discuss, in good faith, these outstanding issues.

RECOMMENDATION:

That Council:

- 1. Write to the Premier of NSW, the Hon Dominic Perrottet MP, requesting his personal attendance at a meeting to be held in the Hawkesbury as soon as possible, to discuss Hawkesbury City Council's requests for immediate flood mitigation, flood recovery and flood resilience (listed below);
- 2. Invite the State Member for Hawkesbury, Robyn Preston MP, to this meeting.
