

Mayor's Message

The challenges of local government are becoming clearer to me as I complete my third term as Mayor of Hawkesbury. The management of such a large local government area with a relatively small and dispersed population is very complex as the needs of our population differ greatly. There is no 'one size fits all' solution to many of the issues that we face.

The most pressing problem we have is lack of financial resources. Years of rate pegging below the rise in the cost of living have meant that our revenue is effectively being eroded. The impact is cumulative. Each year we have to delay a large portion of required maintenance and renewal of many of our assets as we simply cannot afford to meet these costs within our current income. As Mayor, and particularly as a grandfather, this worries me greatly as we are effectively burdening our children and grandchildren with a legacy of a local government area that is not of the standard that it could be. Added to this, our funding sources from other levels of government are also being reduced with one of our main sources, Financial Assistance Grants from the Federal Government, being effectively frozen.

We welcome input from our community on ways in which they feel these issues can be addressed. Some have suggested grants as an option and while Council does receive a significant amount of grant funding – as you will see in this report – grants are rarely offered for maintenance and renewal purposes. Council has presented a balanced budget for many years, relying on efficiencies gained to meet costs but it seems that we have reached a stage where we must now seriously look at the services that we provide and this matter will be the subject of community consultation in the coming year.

We were lucky to escape major damage with the bushfires that raged through the Blue Mountains in October. My heartfelt gratitude goes to all those members of our emergency services, especially the Rural Fire Service, for the work they did in preventing what could have been a tragic event for our community.

We have celebrated a number of historic events throughout this financial year, the most recent being the inaugural raising of the Aboriginal flag and Torres Strait Islander flag at a special ceremony at the Council Chambers.

We also celebrated the Bicentenary of the first crossing of the Blue Mountains and unveiled plaques to commemorate some of our citizens who played a major role in this achievement -William Cox and George Evans – at Ham Common, Clarendon.

This report provides a snapshot of the many projects and activities undertaken by Council throughout the past financial year as well as highlighting projects planned for the next financial year. I hope that you find this report an insight into some of Council's activities which your rates help to fund.

Pool registration a must

New legislation has been introduced in NSW to improve the safety of children in and around backyard swimming pools and spas.

Swimming pool and spa owners are required to register their pools on an online register provided by the State Government. Registration is free at www.swimmingpoolregister.nsw.gov.au or over the counter at Council's Administration Building for \$10. There is a \$220 penalty for owners who fail to register their pool.

Provisions that require property owners to obtain a Swimming Pool Compliance Certificate before property sale or lease will now commence on 29 April 2015, to allow pool owners more time to ensure their pool is compliant. This certificate needs to be attached to the contract for sale or a copy given to a tenant at time of leasing.

Owners may apply for a Swimming Pool Compliance Certificate from Council or an accredited certifier. A Swimming Pool Compliance Certificate is valid for three years, fees apply.

New playground for Richmond

The upgrade of Richmond Park's new playground has been completed on schedule and children, families and school groups have already descended on the new play equipment.

The park features a climbing dome, an adventure themed multi play area, balancing and climbing units as well as old favourites such as seesaws, slides and swings.

Public input and suggestions were very important to ensure that the new playground met the community's needs and expectations. The newly renovated play area was launched in May and is receiving the thumbs up.

Inaugural Hawkesbury Regional Gallery Art Fair

The diversity of Hawkesbury's creative community was showcased for everyone to enjoy at the Hawkesbury Regional Gallery's inaugural Art Fair at Windsor in June/July. The fair featured traditional and contemporary artists, designers, crafters and jewellers from the Hawkesbury. Art works were available for purchase and there were small business-building workshops for the creative industry as well as demonstrations by local and invited practitioners.

The Library Service has also provided numerous activities throughout the year with well over 7,500 people attending events. These events included a Monster Treasure Hunt, Pyjama Dress up Day, local history cemetery tours, the Mayor's Christmas Appeal Launch and author talks. A recent evening with Fred Watson was the Library's most popular event on record. Regular events such as the bookclub, family history group, computer classes and children's storytime remain very popular.

Caring for our Environment

Free workshops – a local success

As part of an educational program over the past year to encourage residents to reduce, reuse, recycle, Council sponsored a roving program of compost and worm farm workshops and gave compost bins or worm farms as prizes to participants and groups.

Eleven sessions were held and around 170 people participated.

1,500 plants to local residents

The Hawkesbury Community Nursery is part of the Hawkesbury Bushcare program and welcomes any volunteers who are keen to help their local area.

The Nursery has given away more than 1,500 native plants to local residents over the past 12 months – at various events, including the Hawkesbury Show. There's also a chance to pick up a free plant at National Tree Day to be held at the Community Nursery as part of Local Government Week celebrations on Saturday, 9 August 2014.

Locals can support this great Community Nursery by purchasing a wide range of plants including trees, shrubs and groundcovers from as little as \$1.

The Hawkesbury Community Nursery grows a number of native plants and volunteers meet on Wednesdays. The Nursery is located at 10 Mulgrave Road, Mulgrave and is open Wednesdays from 9am-1pm.

New garden organics service

Following extensive community consultation, Council introduced a new garden organics collection service in October 2013 to selected urban areas. Judging by the uptake of the service, it has been a remarkable success.

Previously, 20% of the material in our residential garbage bins was garden organics such as grass and hedge clippings, flowers, leaves, plants, weeds, twigs and small branches. Diverting garden organic waste from landfill will greatly benefit Hawkesbury residents in the long term by prolonging the life of Hawkesbury's landfill site.

The material is being processed and reused as mulch, compost, and other products.

First Garage Sale Trail a big hit!

Council participated in one of Australia's biggest community events – the Garage Sale Trail – last October. This event encourages Australians to come together on the same day to reduce waste and reuse pre-loved items in a fun and creative way.

More than 40 Hawkesbury residents and organisations participated by holding a garage sale on Saturday, 26 October 2013. It was a great way for residents to reduce waste, meet their neighbours and make some extra cash.

Nationally, the event redistributed almost one million items from ending up in landfill and has generated more than \$4.5 million in economic activity.



Lower Portland ferry replaced

A newly refurbished ferry has been commissioned for the Lower Portland River crossing to replace the old timber ferry and improve the service for local residents and visitors.

The ferry was provided to Hawkesbury City and The Hills Shire Councils – who jointly fund the ferry service – by the Roads and Maritime Services (RMS). The new ferry has more than doubled the capacity of the previous vessel.

RMS offered to handover a decommissioned ferry to the councils at no cost with councils meeting refurbishment costs of approximately \$500,000.



Linking the Hawkesbury

Council secures Better Boating Grant

Council has secured \$250,000 through the State Government's Roads and Maritime Services Better Boating Grants Program, to match Council's own funding.

These grants will be used to construct a fixed public jetty at Governor Phillip Reserve, Windsor; upgrade the existing boat ramp at Holmes Drive Reserve, Cumberland Reach and refurbish the existing jetty at Hanna Park, North Richmond.

Infrastructure improvement

Council commissioned a data collection survey relating to the condition of local and regional sealed road pavements in 2013. The data collected included video recordings which captured the actual condition of the road network, a roughness and rutting survey as well as data relating to the condition of road signs and lines on the road network.

Results from this survey have now been analysed and are being used by Council to plan future road works and ensure priority is given to repairs and rehabilitation based on the latest information and road conditions.

Results from the survey have demonstrated that approximately 84% of our roads were rated as good or very good, about 15% were rated as satisfactory or fair and less than 2% were rated as poor or failed.

The local road network is a priority for Council and it is continually repairing and improving local roads by using its resources as well as securing funding from State and Federal Government through grants.

Hawkesbury Horizon – revitalising our town centres

Council is currently formulating the Richmond, Windsor and North Richmond Revitalisation Strategy. This strategy is a 'ground up' program aimed at working with local business and community leaders to spearhead a revitalisation program for these town centres which will have flow on effects for all our towns and villages.

The aim of the revitalisation program is to make our business precincts more economically viable into the future and improve the quality of lifestyle for all our residents.

The approach Council is taking will involve key stakeholders, and all community members will have a chance to have their say in formulating the revitalisation strategy. Council aims to be the catalyst for these towns' revitalisation, but needs the community to be involved to make it happen.

E-waste – free collection

Council held a successful e-waste collection event in June at Hawkesbury Showground, Clarendon with approximately 35 tonnes of e-waste collected for recycling. A total of 566 cars attended the e-waste collection event, with 64% of attendees being first time participants.

Old televisions were the most popular drop-off items this year, however computers, DVD players, projectors, cables and many other items that people struggle to dispose of in an environmentally responsible way were also accepted for disposal.

There are many materials that can be recovered from these products. Recycling e-waste can also prevent hazardous materials such as lead, cadmium and arsenic from damaging the environment.

Around 16.8 million televisions, computers and related accessories are disposed of each year in Australia, of this staggering amount only 20-30% of these products are recycled. Keep an eye out on Council's website www.hawkesbury.nsw.gov.au for recycling events.
