Have you heard about how we're transforming Council's Waste Management Facility? This is great news for our community because it is set to make the facility more financially sustainable. At the March Council Meeting, Councillors considered two reports regarding extending the life of the facility, increasing the ability to recover more valuable resources, and expanding the customer base for recoverable items to neighbouring Local Government Areas, which Council resolved to do.

Living sustainably is also helping to reduce the load on Council's Waste Management Facility. Our Hawkesbury Living Sustainably workshop series continues with upcoming free workshops including Waterwise Gardens in May and Solar and Energy Efficiency in June. A new cycleway connecting Kurrajong and Kurmond to North Richmond is coming!

The \$4.538 million Kurrajong to Kurmond Cycleway Project will construct a shared pedestrian and cycle path alongside Bells Line of Road between Kurmond and Kurrajong. It is being funded through the NSW Government's Western Sydney Infrastructure Grants program.

These works will complete a continuous off-road link between North Richmond and Kurrajong, supporting Council's and the community's goal to increase active transport and recreation use by residents and tourists.


Design works have commenced and draft designs are now available for the community to review and to provide comment. Have Your Say today.

Work will then start on paved carparking and the youth space near the amenities building. These works are funded by the Federal Government to the value of \$3 million.

Construction will soon also extend to the rest of the reserve as part of the Western Sydney Infrastructure Grants program. This \$5.423 million grant will see the creation of a new playground, skate park, new amenities building, off-leash dog park, shared walking paths, shelters and barbecues.

MAKE A SPLASH FOR YOUR NEW SWIMMING CENTRE

Hawkesbury City Council is delivering a major upgrade to Richmond Swimming Centre, and we want you to Have Your Say.

Let Council know how you would like to use this new swimming centre, and what services and programs you would like to be offered so it can be the best design possible.

Plans include an indoor and outdoor eight-lane 50m pool with a boom that separates into two 25 metre pools, one with the ability to enclose during winter; as well as a splash park and increased shade and picnic facilities. YOUR NEW ONLINE WASTE GUIDE AND DASHBOARD

Can't remember whether it's yellow or green bin week? Not sure if you can recycle a particular item?

Council has launched the 'Find Your Bin Collection Day' Dashboard and Waste Guide on its website: data.hawkesbury.nsw.gov.au/pages/waste-dashboard

Hawkesbury residents can now search their address, find their bin collection day and see if it's recycling or garden organics collection week through the Online Dashboard. The new search function will also enable Council staff to respond effectively and efficiently to enquiries and reports of a missed service.

Meanwhile, the Waste Guide offers residents the ability to search for different items to know if they can be recycled or need to be disposed of and in which bin or location. This will help us reduce contamination in the recycling and organics bins, allow residents to answer their waste questions quickly and easily, and offer an 'Ask a Waste Expert form' for those trickly items that can cause great debates in the household.



WHAT'S HAPPENING AT THOMAS JAMES BRIDGE







The reinstatement of the historic Thomas James Bridge is well underway. Council is taking great care to ensure the heritage value of the bridge is retained despite the significant program of works that are needed to ensure the bridge will be flood resilient. It is hoped this bridge will serve the Macdonald Valley community for generations to come.

The sandstone block wall has been carefully disassembled. Each block, hand cut by convicts, has been numbered and removed for safe storage, to be reassembled once the bridge is complete. Excavation and pouring for the new bridge footings is also continuing.

Debris from the adjacent landslide is being removed, and stabilisation of the rock face on the Wisemans Ferry approach is underway.

Council is targeting a January 2025 completion, weather and ground conditions permitting.

The approaches on Settlers Road and the adjacent rock face of Thomas James Bridge were seriously damaged during the March 2022 flood, and again during the July 2022 flood.

The road serves as a critical link for residents of the Macdonald Valley south to the rest of Sydney. It is also the oldest in-use convict-built bridge, circa 1830s, and as such is an important heritage item that is worth preserving.







OUR ROAD REPAIRS THE JOURNEY SO FAR

Hawkesbury LGA has **1063km of roads**



Just over 18 months since the last major flood, Council's commitment to repair our weather-damaged roads remains **resolute**.





Since the July 2022 flood, our infrastructure repair teams have made significant progress into the **\$177 million** backlog of roads damaged by floodwaters, landslides and wet weather.



A significant majority of this money has come from state and federal funding programs – the rest from Council's annual budget.

Since the July 2022 flood, Council has spent in total \$66.965 million on road repairs, maintenance and upgrades as of January 2024.



As of January, the total annual spend on roads has risen from \$8.07 million in 2017/2018 to \$41.01 million so far this financial year.



Many of the damaged roads are in regions and communities far away from the urban centres around Windsor and Richmond. For these regional residents, their roads are often the only way in or out. These regional roads often have higher speed limits in more difficult terrain which increases risks to motorists. Council is prioritising the repair of roads in regional areas before roads in urban centres, which have many alternative road routes.

The Draft 2024/2025 Operational Plan has been developed to outline the proposed projects, programs and activities for 2024/2025. It also includes information about rates, fees and charges and estimated income and expenditure.

Some of the highlights of the Draft Operational Plan include:

\$107.6 million on improving local roads and drainage

\$39.8 million on upgrading public spaces, parks, sports and recreation facilities

\$45.6 million on community and culture including community buildings, events, Libraries, Gallery and Museum


\$39.1 million to be spent on waste collection, landfill, and sewer



UPDATES ON THE CURRENT OPERATIONAL PLAN

This year's Operational Plan contains 142 actions that Council seeks to achieve by 30 June 2024. As at 31 December 2023, 134 of these actions were either completed or on track for completion.
