

Mayor's Message

Council has been actively engaging with the community about the future of our assets and services and now we need your input to help us with some important decisions about our community assets.

Like most councils in NSW, we have reached a point where we need to invest more resources in renewing and maintaining our ageing assets, like our roads, buildings and parks.

Our community has told us that the condition of many of these assets are not meeting their expectations, and that Council needs to invest more money in maintaining and upgrading our assets and services. Residents told us which assets were more important to them and they identified roads as a priority followed by the condition of our town centres and public spaces, stormwater drains, footpaths and parks.

Our blend of rural and urban landscapes means that we have to maintain a large number of assets for a relatively small and dispersed population. As a result, our costs are higher.

At the same time, our ability to fund the cost of maintaining our assets is restricted by our financial resources. The revenue we receive from rates increases annually by an amount determined by the Independent Pricing and Regulatory Tribunal (IPART). This set amount is called a rate peg. For many years this increase has not provided the money we need to maintain our community assets to meet the expectations of residents. This year the amount was less than the Consumer Price Index (CPI). Therefore, Council is actively working to find savings and efficiencies. We will need to borrow responsibly, increase income and continue to review services to ensure the best value and greatest positive impact for the Hawkesbury community.

<u>Investing in Your Future</u> outlines three funding options for you to consider. Each option will have a different impact on our assets and the quality of service that Council can deliver into the future.

1867 Flood

The Hawkesbury witnessed a special community gathering at Windsor in late June for the commemoration of the 1867 flood 150 years on – the highest-ever recorded flood in local history.

Locals found themselves in a vibrant and moving atmosphere amid music, performers and storytelling at 'An Evening in the Square' at Thompson Square, which had Olivia Leal Walker, a former Hawkesbury Showgirl as Master of Ceremonies.

Uncle Wes told Dreamtime stories around the campfire at the Howe House gardens and Aaron Jeffery's flood narration brought the events of the 1867 flood to the current community, as everyone present considered the damage caused by floods.

State Emergency Services and Infrastructure NSW put on educational displays as well as informative talks. Council will continue raising awareness within the community about the risks of flooding and the importance of being prepared for future flooding.

Flood Risk Management Strategy launched

Infrastructure NSW has launched Resilient Valley, Resilient Communities - the Hawkesbury-Nepean Valley Flood Risk Management Strategy. The Flood Strategy is a comprehensive long term framework for the NSW Government, Councils, businesses and the community to work together to reduce and manage the flood risk in the Hawkesbury-Nepean Valley.

Council welcomes the opportunity to be involved in community education about the outcomes of the Flood Strategy, given that flooding is an ever present concern for our community. Community assets are a central element in the Flood Strategy, as well as the capacity of the community to respond in a timely way.

Infrastructure NSW and WaterNSW have begun the first steps in a comprehensive environmental assessment process that will include robust community and stakeholder consultation. Thematic History launched


Council recently celebrated the release of the Thematic History of the Hawkesbury, a publication which aims to recognise, preserve and enhance the rich and unique heritage of the Hawkesbury.


The Thematic History highlights the fact that the Darug people were the custodians of this land long before European settlement. Their custodianship of the land saw much of their lives centred around the river that they called Deerubbin but which we call Hawkesbury. They lived, sourced food and undertook their cultural life in close proximity to the river, but had a particular respect for the river's ability to rise and flood.

The Thematic History also highlights how the Hawkesbury has been shaped and defined by its river and floodplain during the custodianship of the Darug and following European settlement.

Copies are being provided to all schools within the Hawkesbury so that they can encourage our future

generations to understand our past and the significant factors that shaped the Hawkesbury we live in today.

Open Day for pets and plants

Come along to the annual Open Day at the Hawkesbury Companion Animal Shelter on Saturday, 29 July, when local residents can get cheap microchips for two pets - proof of residence required, plus a free pet wash. Located at 10 Mulgrave Road, Mulgrave, Hawkesbury Companion Animal Shelter covers 1030 square metres with 70 kennels and a large cattery area. It services the Local Government Areas of Hawkesbury City Council, The Hills Shire Council, Hornsby Shire Council and Penrith City Council.

Shelter staff do their utmost to ensure that as many lost pets as possible are reunited with their owners or found suitable new homes, thanks to our positive partnerships with a number of rescue organisations. The Hawkesbury Companion Animal Shelter has very good rehoming rates. The latest figures, using the 2016 calendar year, indicate that 1505 dogs were either returned to their owners or rehomed, which accounts for 94% of all dogs coming to the Shelter.

For the sixteenth year in a row, Council's Hawkesbury Community Nursery will be giving hundreds of native plants to residents on Saturday, 29 July, in conjunction with the annual Animal Shelter Open Day, in association with Planet Ark's National Tree Day. The free native plants use less fertiliser and less water as they prefer local conditions. The Community Nursery is next door to the Animal Shelter.

Coastal Zone Management Plan

Council's Upper Hawkesbury River Estuary Coastal Zone Management Plan (CZMP) has received certification under the Coastal Protection Act 1979.

Council prepared a CZMP in order to provide strategic direction and guidance on future environmental and strategic planning for the Hawkesbury River and tributaries. The CZMP was developed under the NSW Government's Estuary Management Program in accordance with the Coastal Protection Act 1979. It also complies with the requirements of the NSW Coastal Policy 1997 and the Hawkesbury Nepean Catchment Action Plan 2013.

Gazettal of the CZMP has opened up further opportunities for funding to support identified actions within the Plan.

Thirty nine high priority actions have been identified as part of the CZMP, which have allowed works to be undertaken along the river. More specifically, the following has been completed:

- Bank stabilisation in Governor Phillip Reserve
- Jetty construction at Governor Phillip Reserve
- Foreshore protection at Governor Phillip Reserve
- Boat ramp upgrade at Holmes Drive Reserve
- Boat launch facility at Macquarie Park
- Boat launch facility at Colo Park
- Ongoing riparian restoration at strategic locations.

The CZMP is a document which identifies how Council plans to manage the Upper Hawkesbury River over the next five to ten years. The adopted Plan is available on Council's website <u>www.hawkesbury.nsw.gov.au/ data/</u>assets/pdf_file/0006/66084/CZMP-October-2014.pdf



Windsor Bushcare

Windsor residents have the chance to form a new Bushcare Group, thanks to Bushcare volunteer John Jose, who is asking for people to join him.

John has been single-handedly planting, weeding and restoring the riverbank around the Windsor Wharf Reserve area next to Windsor Bridge, Windsor for the past three years. Native vegetation along riverbanks encourages higher fish populations in rivers. So John's message is: don't dig it up for bait - the exposed soil runs into the river creating murky water with less oxygen, making it difficult for fish to flourish. Our Assets

Infrastructure improvement – a priority for Council

Council continues to upgrade the local road network through its ongoing maintenance and improvements program using Council funding as well as State and Federal grants. Over the financial years 2015-2017, funding to Council from the Australian Government's Roads to Recovery Program has been temporarily doubled to \$4.78 million, allowing Council to address part of its infrastructure backlog through an expanded program of road works. Council is also spending \$100,000 to install new guard rails and replace old guard rails at various locations for improved road safety.

Bridges

West Portland Road Bridge, Lower Portland has now been replaced using \$2.24 million in funding which Council has borrowed under the State Government Local Infrastructure Scheme and Federal Bridges Renewal Programme.

Two timber bridges on Upper Macdonald Road, Higher Macdonald are currently being replaced with anticipated completion by September 2017. Council will spend \$1.7million on the bridge replacements using borrowed funds through the State Government Local Infrastructure Renewal Scheme. The new structures will significantly increase the safety of the bridges for both pedestrians and vehicles.

Investing in Your Future - Have your say

Council's community consultation, 'Investing in your Future' is underway. It's about a proposal for a Special Rate Variation that would commence in July 2018.

Residents have told Council that the condition of many local assets are not meeting their expectations, and that Council needs to invest more money in maintaining and upgrading its assets and services.

The Investing in Your Future brochure sent with rates notices outlines three funding options for community members to consider. Each option will have a different outcome in terms of the standards to which Council manages its assets and delivers its services.

The community consultation includes information kiosks at shopping centres and markets, town meetings, an online survey and a telephone survey.

Stormwater levy

To better meet the Hawkesbury community's expectations for stormwater services, Hawkesbury City Council will introduce a new Stormwater Management Service Charge on 1 July 2017.

The levy will apply to all residential and businesses in Hawkesbury's urban areas (a town or village) for which Council provides stormwater services.

The dedicated funding will be used to improve current stormwater infrastructure and help to meet future demands. This will enable Council to fund improved stormwater service levels in urban areas. The Stormwater Management Service Charge will cost:

- \$25 for a residential property
- \$12.50 for a residential strata property
- \$25 per 350m2 to a maximum amount of \$1,500 for a business property
- \$25 per 350m2 to a maximum amount of \$1500, divided between the strata lots, for a business strata unit property.
