# **HAWKESBURY LIBRARY SERVICE - LOCAL STUDIES FACT SHEET**

# **Brief History**

In 1858 a public meeting was held to discuss the formation and a School of Arts was planned for Richmond. The Richmond Literary Institute was established in 1861 and in 1866 the foundation stone was laid by Miss Bowman with plans to erect a hall on the corner of West Market and March Streets.

The School of Arts was officially opened by the Premier, Sir Henry Parkes on 27 August 1866. The event was chaired by George Bowman JP. The School of Arts, also known as the Richmond Literary Institute, has hosted an array of events over the years including lectures, classes, plays, concerts, dances and flower shows. Other uses included a Skating Rink which opened in the large hall in the 1880s. Movies were also regularly screened during the 1920s. The local Masonic Lodge used the rooms until they acquired their own premises next door.

A subscription library, where members paid a fee to borrow items, was also established and a billiard room was added in 1900.

Richmond Borough Council meetings were held in the School of Arts from 1872 until 1913 when the Council obtained land on the opposite corner and premises constructed.

Richmond Players have used the space for their performances since they were established in 1952.

The original building has been extended several times over the years, including a rear supper room and porch as well as comprehensive renovations in the latter half of the 20th century. Richmond School of Arts is still well used as a meeting place by the community as well as providing a place for events including concerts, markets, parties and exhibitions.
