Hawkesbury History

This area was originally inhabited by the Darug and Darkinjung Aboriginal tribes. They called the river Dyarubbin and it was a vital source of food and transport. Governor Phillip explored the local area in search of suitable agricultural land in 1789 and he discovered and named the Hawkesbury River after Baron Hawkesbury. Although it was Phillip's plan to eventually locate a new settlement on the Hawkesbury, it was Lt.-Gov. Major Francis Grose who established on the banks of the Hawkesbury 22 settlers (emancipated convicts) on 30-acre farms. The fertile plains quickly produced crops which the colony needed. This region also played a significant role in the early development of the colony of NSW. Governor Macquarie toured the district in 1810 and named the Five Towns: Richmond, Wilberforce, Pitt Town, Castlereagh and Windsor (previously known as Green Hills). Macquarie is also introduced town planning to the area and surveyed and established streets, schools, cemeteries and places to worship.

The area features sections of world heritage, the Hawkesbury, Colo, Grose and Macdonald Rivers and a number of exceptional natural features.

About the Local Studies Collection


The Local Studies Collection at Hawkesbury Library contains a variety of materials, historical and current, available for research. Items in the Local Studies Collection are not for loan.

Maps

Maps are an interesting source of information for researchers and students. Studying maps can be very helpful, looking at the landscape and land settlement, can be productive.

The map collection forms part of the Local Studies Collection of Hawkesbury Library Service and is housed in the Map Cabinet and is divided into six subjects areas, then in numerical order. Parish maps

Parish maps form part of the early land recording system and provide the key to early ownership. The name listed on the map is the person who was first granted, or acquired, the property. Local parish and town maps for the Hawkesbury and surrounding LGAs are held in the map cabinet in the drawers marked Parish maps. Historical maps

A selection of historical maps are kept. These include copies of maps from State Records and other sources as well as copies of the subdivision maps from the State Library of NSW collection. Use the catalogue <https://aurora.hawkesbury.nsw.gov.au/library/> to search for specific maps.

An excellent overview is contained in the publication **Macquarie's towns** written by Ian Jack shelved at RL994.42JAC which shows some of the early maps of the Five Towns.

Researching a property

Researching the history of a specific piece of land, will assist with researching a property by providing details of who owned that piece of land, from the time it was granted and past and subsequent owners. This information will usually be found in what was the Land Titles System, formerly the Land and Property Information and now the Land Registry Services in NSW. NSW Land Registry Services create and maintain land title records on behalf of the NSW Government. You can use their Online Portal to access land title services. To see what free searches are available via the Online Portal see <https://www.nswlrs.com.au/Find-Records> Some records may still have to be consulted at their office in Queens Square, Sydney or via the portal at State Records at Kingswood.

New South Wales is divided into **COUNTIES**. In the Hawkesbury there are three counties in our Local Government area (LGA). The counties are divided into PARISHES. 
CUMBERLAND https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Cumberland_County,_New_South_Wales
Named in 1788 after Duke of Cumberland, later King of Hanover, by Governor Arthur Phillip.

NORTHUMBERLAND

Was named after Northumberland in England in 1804 by Lieutenant Charles Menzies.

The map drawn from original sources showing some of the first land grants in the area.


Copies are available for sale at Hawkesbury Library, Windsor.

Topographical and contour maps.

Topographical maps are popular and show the topography which looks at the shapes/contours of the landscape & features such as rivers, creeks, hills etc.

Place names - Hawkesbury district

Where is Mulgrave Place or the Green Hills? Did you know that Glossodia was once called Currency Creek, Maraylya was Forrester, North Richmond was previously Enfield and South Windsor was known as Newtown? Unfortunately, the meanings of place names have not always been recorded in the past. Property names or local names have been used on official documents and maps but the mean and exact location is difficult to confirm.
