

BURNT INTO MEMORY



6 JUNE - 17 AUGUST

In the summer of 2019-2020 communities across Australia experienced some of the worst bushfires in living memory. Known as the Black Summer Bushfires, the impact of these collective 'fire events' was catastrophic on individuals, their communities and the entire nation.

Burnt into Memory explores the complex impact of these events on individuals and communities within the context of reflection, healing, resilience and forward momentum.

The exhibition will include work from artists living and working in the Hawkesbury, Blue Mountains Region and beyond such as Katherine Boland, Jody Graham, Wona Bae and Charlie Lawler. These works were created in the aftermath of the fires; including recent responses.

BRIDGING THE HAWKESBURY/ DYARUBBIN: THE HISTORY OF WINDSOR BRIDGE

Windsor Bridge was the oldest, existing bridge crossing the Dyarubbin (Hawkesbury River). Opened in 1874, it was cited as an engineering marvel. This new exhibition explores the history and significance of this bridge, the engineering feat and expertise utilised during its construction and the communities fight to save it.

Bridging the Hawkesbury/Dyarubbin: The History of Windsor Bridge features never before seen images and original objects from the bridge shown for the first time.

BANGADYI NAWI -BUILDING A CANOE


The Nawi is a traditional canoe and a living artifact made by local Aboriginal high school students during an inter-generational camp facilitated by and held at Brewongle Environmental Education Centre. **Bangadyi Nawi** engaged respectfully with the community and will continue to shape learning opportunities for the whole community.

The Bangadyi Nawi project won the 2024 Leo Kelly OAM Arts and Culture Award from Local Government NSW and the 2023 IMAGinE Award for Engagement Programs.






