# Pandorea pandorana (Wonga-Wonga Vine)

## **Description**

A tall, robust, woody climber.

# Flower and Foliage

Cascades of white drooping flowers with purple markings in spring. Glossy leaves. Juvenile leaves are fern-like.

## **Maintenance**

Low maintenance, tip prune to increase foliage. Prune to remove excess & after flowering. Will tolerate frost, however if grown in a cold climate, protection is required.

### **Occurs**

Sheltered forests, often on rocky slopes. Wide spread along the eastern coast, west of the ranges & inland Australia. Tolerates most soils, as long as it has good drainage.

#### **Uses**

An ideal evergreen screen; over an old tree stump or screening a shed etc. Train over a fence, pergola or trellis. Works well in nearly any garden. Attracts birds.
